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LET GO OF THEROPE

When my sister, who is nine years older than I am, got married, I inherited a brother-in-law, Stephen. Stephen in his younger years was ornery, funny, and always ready for a good time. Whether we were going to haunted houses or to the lake, it was always

going to be a blast!
But there was one thing about Stephen. He liked to drive the boat on the lake fast. I mean, fast. Especially when he was pulling a middle school new sister-in-law who

did not like going fast behind the boat on skies!

Stephen taught me to water ski, and for the most part I enjoyed it. There was a thin line for me between terrified I was going to face plant into the water, feeling like cement, or an irrational fear that somehow my body was going to be tied up in that rope and drug for all eternity if I fell off my skies. One thing I learned quickly was that if I lost my balance, I needed to let go of the rope! I needed to surrender to the loss of balance! It didn't take me long to learn this because when my new, ornery brother-in-law was behind the wheel of the boat, and I fell off, my body did not bode well being dragged behind full speed ahead!

It's ironic to me that this is a lesson I learned within seconds of falling off my skies. It probably took less than a few seconds, more likely it was a millisecond for me to realize that it was time to let go of the rope. So why is it that this lesson is so difficult to learn when in relationship to work, the to-do list, the ambition, the activities, and all the things?

We, I say we collectively very aware of the generalization I am about to make about our culture, we are going through life on skies, behind a boat with a fast driver behind the wheel. The waves are crashing, the turns are wicked, and yet we hold on. We have yet to learn the wisdom of letting go, or from an old Sabbath description: Stop now.

Wayne Muller, in his book Sabbath, speaks

to the essence of Sabbath, and what takes

place when the sun sets on a Sabbath evening:

...Whether [the Jewish Sabbath] comes at a wintry 4:30 or late on a summer evening. Sabbath is not dependent on our readiness to stop. We do not stop when we are finished. We do not stop when we complete our phone calls, finish our project, get through this stack of messages, or get out this report that is due tomorrow. We stop because it is time to stop. Sabbath requires surrender.

Sabbath comes, whether we are ready or not. Sabbath comes, not when we have everything accomplished, we want to accomplish, because there is always something else to accomplish. Sabbath doesn't come when we are in a good mental space. Sabbath doesn't come when it is particularly convenient. When Sabbath comes, it is our turn to let go of the rope, and to surrender to the holy, blessed rest that is upon us. With Sabbath comes an opportunity to surrender to the hurrying, fast-paced action of the boat of our lives, to surrender to the waves of chaos and frenetic energy, and to allow our bodies to let go of the rope that tethers us to every demand, communication, pressure, and activity that awaits us, and allow our bodies to slow, until we are simply bobbing in our life vest up and down in the gentle waves of a rest-filled water. John Mark Comer says in his book The Ruth-

John Mark Comer says in his book The Ruthless Elimination of Hurry:

It's like my soul catches up with my body. When we let go of the demands and pressures of our schedules, expectations, and non-stop and unrealistic plans, our souls catch up with our bodies as we wade in the water of rest.

This is the most difficult thing about Sabbath for me: Letting go of the rope, letting go of the demands, the pressure, the expectations, and allowing my body to slowly and gently come to a rest, and easing my soul back into my body.

I wonder what it might look like for us to let go and surrender to Sabbath this month as we prepare for Easter? I wonder what it might look like for us to observe an hour,

two hours, of simply letting go, and allowing our souls to catch up to our bodies? My hunch tells me, like my skiing experience, that once we learn to let go, it won't take us long to keep letting go because our souls crave this rest, much like by body craved not being pulled by a boat going way too fast for way too long. Will you let go with me? Will you surrender with me? Let's see what Sabbath can be as we wade in the waters of rest this month.




