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Terrible, Horrible, No Good, Very Bad Day

The words of author Judith Viorst ring in my mind: "Terrible, horrible, no good, very bad day." Have you ever had one of those days? That literally everything



that could go wrong will go wrong? Thanks, Murphy! I had one of those days. It started out okay, it was an early rise and getting off to an early start generally makes

since I prefer the night hours than the sunrise ones. I reset my alarm twice because—sleep. Once I was finally up, I drug myself to the bathroom to start getting ready. It was a slow start. As the day wore on, it didn't seem to be getting better. Things were just cumulating. Have you ever had that day? But for me, what was most striking was the way this day ended. When I finally got home, I was ready to be home and ready for bed. I was sitting on the couch and my son was in front of me with a glass of very cold water. How do I know it's a cold of very cold water, you ask? Good question, thanks for asking! He looks me right in the eyes, lunges toward me and all the water with it, streaking across the living room with a laugh of delight! I am soaking from head to toe. Freezing. In an exasperated voice I said under my breath, "That's it, I'm done." I'm done with this day. I need to go back to bed, wake up, and try it all over again because this day is just getting worse. Have you ever had that day? A cold water in your face kind of day? And it doesn't seem to be getting any better? I heard recently that you know what kind of day you're going to have in the first eight minutes of your day. I believe it. And that makes me pause.

What if the first eight minutes of my day was spent, not groggily resetting my alarm to sleep longer or getting into the shower begrudgingly, but what if the first eight minutes of my day was spent in stillness, being in the presence of God? Not studying, not striving, not even talking, simply being. I wonder how that might change my day. I wonder how it might change your day. In her book How to Lead When You Don't Know Where You're Going, Susan Beaumont describes stillness as "an open state of readiness, awe and wonder that undergirds a discernment process." If we are not able to be still, to stop, to pause, to wonder, to take in the moment and be present to this moment, the discernment process is impossible. What if, beginning our day in the first eight minutes, simply being with God, leads us into a day that is in tune with the work of God and allows us to discern the Spirit of God in the everyday-ness that we experience? Discernment has been used in church circles for generations to describe the seeing of God's Spirit and direction in a given circumstance. Often when we face crisis, we lean into a time of discernment on where to go and what to do. When we have a big decision like whether to have children, to begin a new job. to have that conversation with our child's teacher, to have that csation with our loved one, how to have that conversation, these are also circumstances in which we might discern. What if our baseline, our natural posture, was one of discernment, and not just when we need direction or an answer to something, but as a posture toward our day? And what if, as a community of faith, we took seriously the

And what if, as a community of faith, we took seriously the practice of discernment in everything that we do? What might this faith community look like? We ended the month of September with a Ministry Team Visioning Retreat centering around mindfulness and discernment. Terrible, Horrible, No Good, Very Bad Day continued..

Author Parker Palmer writes of an experience of discernment in his life, wondering about his vocation and purpose in life. Palmer leaned into a traditional Quaker counsel that says, "have faith and the way will open". He found himself frustrated because the way was not opening for him. He sat in stillness and nothing was coming out of the stillness. He then went to a wise Quaker woman, telling her his quandary. Ruth said to Palmer, "In sixty-plus years of living, way has never opened in front of me." And with a grin, she added "But a lot of way has closed behind me, and that's had the same guiding effect." Sometimes moments of discernment require us to look at what is naturally closing, what is naturally coming to an end in order to walk through the way open in front of us. (Even if it is the close of day that ends with cold water in your face!) Our ministry teams prayed together and began to search out where they are sensing energy, life, and the Spirit's leading. There were wonderful things shared: Energy and life around the neighboring movement, life around getting youth involved in serving communion, energy around continuing to worship and provide meaningful music together, energy around continuing to steer the church to make disciples. When we finished our time together, each of our ministry teams spent time in prayer together. Some holding hands, eyes shut and heads bowed in fervent and heartfelt prayer. It was evident that God was up to something. God is up to something in our hearts. As we were still and chose to be present to the work of God among us, we were receptive and ready to hear from God. The work of discernment is ongoing. Every day. Never ending. Each day we are invited into stillness and God's gentle Spirit waits for us there, if we are willing to pause long enough to sense it. My prayer for us is that amidst the busyness of life, we are able to take a moment or two to be still and encounter this life-giving Spirit, and to discern the movement and invitation of God around us. What door is God opening? And perhaps, just as a wise quaker woman once suggested, what doors might be closing? The cold water in the face for me was a bit of an invitation for the day. I honestly don't even know how my son had water that cold in his cup-it was breath-taking. It seemed that as the door closed on a "terrible, horrible, no good, very bad day", God invited me to an opening of the next day, into a new day. I sense an invitation to wake up to God's presence through the stillness of being present with God. My hope for you is that it does not take a cold cup of water in your face to become still, but that every morning when you rise, you sense God's invitation for the first eight minutes perhaps, to be still and simply be with God. May we be a community who walks in discernment, seeking out and listening to the presence of God in every single moment. Here's to another day! -Rev. Lacey Wheeler
