We did a thing.

We signed up our three-year-old for soccer, and my spouse and I have been so excited! Our son? That's another story.

Kicking the ball around the house is one thing, but going to soccer is scary to this little one. New people, new places, new experiences.

When it was time to get ready for the very first soccer practice, our very independent and adamant boy did everything in his power to stall. The King of Stalling, that one: Hiding behind the couch, running around, avoiding putting clothes on. You know—the usual.

We were already running ten minutes behind and putting cleats and clothes on was the last thing on this boy's mind.

We rolled up to our very first practice. Hope still somewhat lingering in our hearts. The minute we rolled up, piercing cries from the back of the truck. "I don't want to go to soccer!"

When we asked if he was scared, he said yes he was scared and didn't want to go.

Through screaming, kicking, coaxing, and a lot of talking, he finally made it to the soccer field and mostly spent the practice on the side-lines with mom and dad.

It was a first step-we made it to practice! Barely!

And then, we experienced some pretty incredible humans who both cared for our son, and us, as we endured the struggle of the first practice. Kids on the field, and the coach, called out to our son from the field, inviting him to participate in the fun. Looking over, calling him by name, they invited him past his fear.

Parents who were also on the sidelines watching their incredible kids participating wonderfully in practice said to us, "Don't worry! We were there last year!" They assured us it would get better and even gave me a hug of comfort when we first arrived. My heart melted as our struggle was seen and support offered in such a brief exchange.

Ultimately, our son got on the field-because his dad went out on the field with him, and maybe next time he just might play with the other kids!

Our son was beginning an activity he had never experienced before, he was going to a place he had not played at, and with some children he didn't know. This was scary.

As his parents, we were also venturing into new territory. We didn't know how much our parenting was causing this behavior or if he was just being a kid. We questioned all night whether we were bad parents or if there was something we could have done differently. Parent guilt is real, y'all!

This experience was uncomfortable and scary for us too.

And the incredible welcome of a few parents and children made us feel like we weren't alone, that it was okay that we were there, and we weren't horrible parents. The welcoming atmosphere helped our son venture into the field bit by bit-even if it was with his dad.

These incredible people brought with them a Gospel Welcome, giving us life in the midst of anxiety, and bringing God's welcome-even to a soccer field!

So many people feel this way about church.

It is scary to try a church out for the first time. First-time guests don't know where they are supposed to park, where the nursery is, where the bathrooms are, if the people are friendly, or if they will be accepted into the community at all. This is a risky and vulnerable place to be.

And the people can make all the difference.

Research suggests that guests make up their minds about whether they will come back to a church within two minutes of entering.

Two.

And many people make up their mind by the time they enter the building!

What does this mean?

We are on the verge of a season where folks who have not been in church for a while are mustering up the courage to attend for Easter Sunday.

A Gospel Welcome Cont...

For one day, and for various reasons, folks will put on their soccer clothes, lace up their cleats, and meagerly and tentatively sit on the sidelines or maybe kick a ball or two.

And it will be what you and I do to include them, welcome them, that will make the difference.

According to the Lewis Center for Leadership, people who are engaging in churches today are not looking for programing first, or even service opportunities, but are looking for relationship. They are looking to experience deep connection with other people who will be on their team and help them to make the transition from a not so often church goer to a regular guest at church.

In the article Three Touchstones of Welcoming Newcomers Today from Lewis Center for Church Leadership, three things matter to people who are connecting in churches:

- Safe Place: A judgment-free place where a guest's space is respected as well as their sensitivities to physical space and even physical touch, and letting the guest lead in a handshake or otherwise.
- 2. People Matter: People don't join institutions these days, they make friends and spend time in community with those friends. It's all about relationship and personal connection.
- 3. Joyful Energy: People experience the joy that comes from abundant life in Christ.

Dr. Amy Oden, a seminarian professor for more than 35 years describes hospitality, or welcome, as this:

"At its deepest, hospitality points to God...the deepest welcomes, often unexpected, profoundly shape our view of ourselves, of others, and of God...the point of gospel hospitality is to invite others to experience the living, welcoming God and to experience the living welcoming God in others...ultimately, the gospel hospitality is God's welcome into abundant life, into God's own life."

As we prepare for Palm Sunday and Easter Sunday, may we lean into God's gospel hospitality, one that welcomes unexpectedly in ways that lead to abundant life!

Check out these Welcoming Tips to try out this week in service!

Ten-Foot Rule: Anytime you come within ten feet of a new guest, just say "hi"!

Five-Minute Rule: After the worship service, only talk to people you do not know for the first five minutes following service! Most guests leave quickly after their first time in worship and when we focus on getting to know people around us for those five minutes, we can make connections and build relationships!

Just Ask Their Name: See someone you don't know or recognize but don't know their name? Simply say, "Hello, my name is , I know we've met before, can you remind me of your name?"

Nobody expects anyone to remember all the names from one encounter! Give yourself some grace, and let's meet some people!




